#### IN HIS FOOTSTEPS

I recently found myself thinking about an old saying that I am sure many of you are familiar with: "Never judge a man until you have walked a mile in his shoes." The origin of it seems to be found in a slight adaptation of a very similar line in Mary T. Lathrop's 1895 poem "Judge Softly." The point of that line, and indeed the entire poem, is to have empathy for the struggles of others

rather than rushing to judge them, for we know not what unseen burdens they carry.

However, I found myself jumping from the line of that poem to one of our most beloved Catholic devotions emphasized in a particular way during the season of Lent; namely, the Stations of the Cross. For in the prayers of the stations, we indeed "walk" in the very footsteps of Jesus Christ. Unlike so many of our Catholic prayers and devotions by which we reflect upon Jesus (or Mary or one of the saints) "from the outside," in the Stations of the Cross we are invited to immerse ourselves into the mystery of Our Lord's Passion and crucifixion "from the inside" by walking with him, every step of the way, the very path he trod—all the way from his agony in the garden to his entombment.



The origin of this Lenten devotion dates back to the 13th century, when the Franciscans were given custody of the holy sites in Jerusalem. Pilgrims who traveled to the Holy Land would (quite literally) walk the path Jesus walked during his Hassion, stopping to pray at the various locations of key events.

In the centuries that followed, many of the faithful were unable to make a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. So many more of the faithful could participate in such a "walking in the footsteps of Christ," the Franciscans began building outdoor shrines that replicated the holy sites in Jerusalem. At this time, there was no "set" number of stations, and various shrines would have as few as seven to as many as thirty stations. Typically, at the various stops along the path, there would be life-sized statues depicting the mystery being recalled. Around the year 1700, the number of stations was fixed at the present-day 14 stations. In the mid-1800s, the pope gave permission for stations to be erected inside of parish churches all over the world.

We will be praying the Stations of the Cross as a parish every Friday of Lent at 7 p.m. in the church. It is my hope that everyone will be able to participate in this devotion at least once or twice during this sacred season. It provides a unique and beautiful way of walking in the footsteps of Christ and immersing ourselves more deeply into what Jesus endured for our salvation.

We adore You, O Christ, and we praise You. Because, by Your holy cross, You have redeemed the world.



# GOD HAS GIVEN YOU CHARISMS TO HELP BUILD HIS KINGDOM

Okay, here's a quick story with a point: In high school, I was invited to help lead a retreat. Guided by our youth minister, my peers and I shared our testimonies,

led discussions, prayed together, and received a lot of wisdom from faithful adults. One teen shared a very personal story as part of his testimony, and I was charged to introduce him and his story. I was pretty flummoxed about what to say, especially considering the gravity of the story. I thought about it a lot and even prayed about it. And then, when it was time to stand up in front of everyone, I remember looking at the group in front of me and just knowing what I had to say.

It took all of 10 seconds, but somehow the room went from fidgety and bored to eyes wide and glued to the front. It felt like I had this (pleasantly) burning coal inside me that I had to let out from my lips. What I said had an immediate and powerful effect—beyond my own ability. After the talk, several people came up to me and told me the introduction was really good and set my friend up perfectly for his talk.

Looking back over my life, I see other times when God has worked through me. Like when I was in 8th grade and needed to write an unprompted letter of encouragement (even though I was an otherwise uninterested teen) to the poor, bedraggled Confirmation coordinators. Or when I was in college and people, for some reason, were moved to tears by my third-rate poems. Or in my ministry work, when I'm woefully under-qualified to talk about a topic, yet somehow what I say gives life, hope, peace, and joy or invites conversion in some way.

Isaiah 50:4 gives me chills every time I read it because it feels like God is personally speaking to me, "The Lord GOD has given me a well-trained tongue, that I might know how to answer the weary a word that will waken them."

To be clear, I don't think I'm some sort of divine oracle and always say or do the right thing (just ask my wife). But it does mean that, for some reason God, desires to work through me in this consistent and recurring way, and it has helped others to know him more deeply.

It turns out that there's a name for that experience. It's called the charism of prophecy. Charisms are gratuitous gifts from God that produce results above and beyond our natural abilities. They are always for others and draw people into a closer relationship with Jesus Christ (*Called and Gifted Discernment Process Complete Training Guide*, p. 7). The charism of prophecy, "[e]mpowers a Christian to be a channel of divine truth and wisdom by communicating a word or call of God to individuals or a group through inspired words or actions" (*Called and Gifted Guide*, p. 19). I wanted to share this story because you might have had an experience like what I've described—like you have suddenly been energized, found your place, have joyful satisfaction doing something that many others don't, or your work is suddenly fruitful and effective without undue struggle (*Called and Gifted Guide*, p. 11). Maybe it's helping people achieve their goals, acts of service, bringing clarity and organization to groups, welcoming people, giving encouragement, teaching, crafting useful or beautiful things that somehow or another connect people back to Jesus. Each of those could be a charism God gave you to build his kingdom.

If you've had an experience like what I've described, or if you'd like to, come discern your charisms with our parish family on April 13 at our Called and Gifted Workshop. Hear stories of normal people who God used in extraordinary ways. Take the inventory to help you discern how God consistently works through you in the lives of others. Learn about charisms. And most of all, come so you can tune in to those gratuitous gifts and perhaps allow the Lord to continue to work through you in even deeper ways. Like in my story, God has greater things in store for your life and work than you or I can do under our own power. We at St. Gertrude Parish want to help you live that out.

## THE BIBLE LADIES — SARAH

Sarah is one of the most intriguing figures of the Bible. Her origin, role in the life of her husband, Abraham, antagonistic relationship with her servant, Hagar and even her bold attitude toward God's messengers all indicate a colorful

personality that defies the simplistic cliché of the superiority of men over women in the Bible. Let us examine a few of the marked aspects of her life.

#### Sarah's Origin

Twice (Genesis 12:13 and Genesis 20:13), Abraham asked Sarah to state that she is his sister. We will explore the reason for Abraham's awkward request, but first, let us answer this fundamental question: Was our father Abraham asking his wife to lie? The answer may seem obvious: Yes, he was asking her to lie since she was his wife. However, two elements make it necessary to qualify this answer. First, we read in Genesis 20:12 that Sarah was truly Abraham's sister—or to be exact, his half-sister. She and Abraham had the same father, Terah, but she had a different mother. The other aspect is that marriage between siblings was not uncommon in the Middle East, particularly among the higher classes. The reason for such marriage, later condemned by the Law of Moses, especially in Leviticus, is that the higher class decided not to mingle with the lower classes. The pharaonic dynasty in Egypt, for example, had many marriages between brothers and sisters to protect the divine rank of the emperor and his descendants. Besides, there is a metaphorical usage of the word "sister" for one's wife, which we frequently hear in the Song of Songs (Song 4:9, 10, 12; 5:1).

#### Sarah Saves Abraham

The two verses above that mention Abraham's request for Sarah to call herself his sister are also the verses that show Abraham's fear of losing his life if he is discovered as Sarah's husband. It is surely an ungentlemanly demand from our father in faith. There are two ways to interpret this awkward situation. The first interpretation looks at the two episodes as an illustration to what God had promised Abraham in his initial call for him to leave his country. Indeed, God has promised Abraham, saying, "I will bless those who bless you and curse those who curse you" (Genesis 12:3). In their attempts to marry Sarah, Pharaoh and Abimelech, albeit unknowingly, insulted Abraham and, consequently, incurred the curse that God reserved to those who curse Abraham. Thus, the two episodes illustrate God's promise to Abraham. The other interpretation that meets the agreement of today's sensitivity is that by saving the life of Abraham, Sarah allowed the plan of salvation to take place. If the salvation willed by God had to start by the election of a certain people, Israel, it is right to thank not only Abraham who became the instrument of the election of Israel, but also Sarah who twice saved her husband's life, allowing God's plan of salvation to be implemented. These are passages that belong to a time and a mentality where the role of the male is hegemonic. Yet, they are also a reminder of the decisive role of women in our Biblical history. Furthermore, they are passages of refinement and human touches. See, for example, how Abraham approaches Sarah with his awkward demand of hiding that she is his wife: "I know that you are of beautiful appearance. . . . please say that you are my sister, that it may go well with me for your sake, and that I may live thanks to you" (Genesis 12:13). He starts by complimenting her for her beauty before presenting her with his uneasy request. Typical of an embarrassed husband asking his wife to do something she dreads.

#### Sarah, the Mother of Isaac

I will reserve the treatment of the tumultuous relationship between Sarah and her Egyptian maiden to the article about Hagar. The events that led to the conception and birth of Isaac are also tumultuous, though in a comic way. While it is understandable at Sarah's age (90, according to Genesis 17:17) to wonder whether the promise of pregnancy and giving birth can be real, her laughter at such eventuality is presented as a lack of faith, a doubt in God's capacity of



accomplishing a miracle. Abraham, too, laughed at the prospect of having a child at the age of 99 (Genesis 17:17), yet he did not negate his laughter, which Sarah did (Genesis 18:15). Her punishment, therefore, was that God would have the last laugh, since she will conceive and give birth to a son whose name will be Isaac, a noun taken from the Hebrew verb *sachaq* "to laugh."
