AVOIDING CONFESSION THIS LENT

For anyone who has been Catholic for any length of time, or even for non-Catholics who have some sense of what Catholicism is all about, it is commonly known that of all the liturgical seasons of the year, the season of Lent is the one we most associate with going to Confession. As we are more than

halfway through the season of Lent at this point, many in the parish have availed themselves to this beautiful sacrament. And yet . . . I suspect there are many others who are wrestling with the idea. And so, for the benefit of those who are uncertain, who are divided, who haven't yet decided whether or not to go to Confession this Lent, I would like to address a few of the reasons that sometimes cause people to stay away from the sacrament.

I know I'm going to commit these same sins again, so by going to confession, am I not just being a hypocrite?

No, please never think that way! It is true that for most of us, there are habitual sins that we fall victim to time & time again. And so, even as we are confessing them, we have a sense that the odds are pretty good we are going to fall into them again. But as long as we have the **desire** to try to eliminate those sins from our lives, we can fruitfully receive the sacrament of penance. In fact, the grace we receive from God through that sacrament is perhaps the most powerful aid available to us in our battle to avoid those sins in the future. Now, if I am in a pattern of sin that I have absolutely *no desire* to leave behind and *no desire* to even to **attempt** to change . . . then yes, in that circumstance, to confess would be hypocritical. But when I am truly sorry about the patterns of sin that have a grip on me, and I wish to be free of them (even though I recognize I am very weak) . . . bringing those sins to confession can both ease our conscience of our past failures and strengthen us in our fight against those sins in the future.

I've done something terrible. I'm so ashamed of it, I can't imagine being able to say it out loud to anyone, not even a priest.

The first thing I would say to this (though it might sound a bit shocking) is it is GOOD that you feel ashamed! In the face of a serious sin, we *ought* to feel guilty and ashamed. This is a wonderful thing . . . because it tells us our "moral compass" is functioning as it ought to be. And while it is absolutely true that having to "say it out loud" can be a difficult thing . . . I promise you, it will be an incredibly FREEING thing as well. When we have to speak it out loud, we bring it out of the darkness inside ourselves and out into the light, where Christ our Light dwells. By bringing it to the Light, we allow His light and his love to dissolve away the darkness of that sin. So while, at a human level, I understand the difficulty . . . I encourage you to just "let go" and give it over to God. You'll feel 1,000 percent better. (And on a side note, my personal advice is that when you go to confession,

if you have 1 or 2 sins that are the really "big ones" you are most ashamed of . . . name those first. Begin with them. Right off the bat. You'll feel a weight lifted off your shoulders that will make the rest of the experience of that confession so much easier.)

What is Father going to think of me if I tell him my sins?!? He's going to think I'm some terrible, horrible person! He'll never look at me the same way again!

Okay, so first of all, all the confessionals at our parish are currently set up so the penitent goes to confession "behind the screen," so that the priest will not see who you are. And believe it or not, screens really muffle people's voices. But no matter what, I promise you, priests DO NOT CARE about the sins you confess. Sin is boring. Other people's sins are especially boring. Even if we somehow do recognize your voice (which is extraordinarily rare), I can assure you, what we hear in confession does not remain in our memory. Next time we see you we aren't going to recoil in horror at your presence like some swamp creature has just walked into the room. My attitude (and some of you who have had your confession heard by me have heard me say these exact words to you) is this: "Okay, so you're a sinner? Perfect. You'll fit right in with the rest of us here. Welcome to the club." Because that's the reality. We're all sinners, and we all have particular sins we are more susceptible to. There is nothing you are going to confess that will shock or scandalize any of the priests. That said, if you are truly so self-conscious about confessing to a priest you know that it might keep you away from the sacrament, then research when confessions at another parish (or shrine or wherever) are offered and go there. The important thing is that you GO, and receive the beautiful grace of this sacrament.

EVANGELIZATION AND FAITH FORMATION



In honor of the 150th anniversary of the proclamation of St. Joseph as the patron of the universal Church in 2020, Pope Francis released the apostolic letter, Patris corde (With a Father's Heart). The following is an excerpt from the concluding section, "a father in the shadows":

The Polish writer Jan Dobraczynski, in his book, *The Shadow of the Father*, tells the story of Saint Joseph's life in the form of a novel. He uses the evocative image of a shadow to define Joseph. In his relationship to Jesus, Joseph was the earthly shadow of the heavenly Father: he watched over him and protected him, never leaving him to go his own way. We can think of Moses' words to Israel: "In the wilderness... you saw how the Lord your God carried you, just as one carries a child, all the way that you traveled" (*Deut* 1:31). In a similar way, Joseph acted as a father for his whole life.

Fathers are not born, but made. A man does not become a father simply by bringing a child into the world, but by taking up the responsibility to care for that child. Whenever a man accepts responsibility for the life of another, in some way he becomes a father to that person.

Children today often seem orphans, lacking fathers. The Church too needs fathers. Saint Paul's words to the Corinthians remain timely: "Though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers" (1 Cor 4:15). Every priest or bishop should be able to add, with the Apostle: "I became your father in Christ Jesus through the Gospel" (ibid.). Paul likewise calls the Galatians: "My little children, with whom I am again in travail until Christ be formed in you!" (4:19).

Being a father entails introducing children to life and reality. Not holding them back, being overprotective or possessive, but rather making them capable of deciding for themselves, enjoying freedom and exploring new possibilities. Perhaps for this reason, Joseph is traditionally called a "most chaste" father. That title is not simply a sign of affection, but the summation of an attitude that is the opposite of possessiveness. Chastity is freedom from possessiveness in every sphere of one's life. Only when love is chaste, is it truly love. A possessive love ultimately becomes dangerous: it imprisons, constricts and makes for misery. God himself loved humanity with a chaste love; he left us free even to go astray and set ourselves against him. The logic of love is always the logic of freedom, and Joseph knew how to love with extraordinary freedom. He never made himself the center of things. He did not think of himself, but focused instead on the lives of Mary and Jesus.

Joseph found happiness not in mere self-sacrifice but in self-gift. In him, we never see frustration but only trust. His patient silence was the prelude to concrete expressions of trust. Our world today needs fathers. It has no use for tyrants who would domineer others as a means of compensating for their own needs. It rejects those who confuse authority with authoritarianism, service with servility,

discussion with oppression, charity with a welfare mentality, power with destruction. Every true vocation is born of the gift of oneself, which is the fruit of mature sacrifice. The priesthood and consecrated life likewise require this kind of maturity. Whatever our vocation, whether to marriage, celibacy or virginity, our gift of self will not come to fulfillment if it stops at sacrifice; were that the case, instead of becoming a sign of the beauty and joy of love, the gift of self would risk being an expression of unhappiness, sadness and frustration.

When fathers refuse to live the lives of their children for them, new and unexpected vistas open up. Every child is the bearer of a unique mystery that can only be brought to light with the help of a father who respects that child's freedom. A father who realizes that he is most a father and educator at the point when he becomes "useless," when he sees that his child has become independent and can walk the paths of life unaccompanied. When he becomes like Joseph, who always knew that his child was not his own but had merely been entrusted to his care. In the end, this is what Jesus would have us understand when he says: "Call no man your father on earth, for you have one Father, who is in heaven" (*Mt* 23:9).

In every exercise of our fatherhood, we should always keep in mind that it has nothing to do with possession, but is rather a "sign" pointing to a greater fatherhood. In a way, we are all like Joseph: a shadow of the heavenly Father, who "makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust" (*Mt* 5:45). And a shadow that follows his Son.

At least one of the current proposals could also threaten religious hospitals, charities, schools, and other organizations that do not enable or cover these medical procedures, and could even apply to minors

ASK A PRIEST—HOW CAN GOD THE FATHER KNOW SOMETHING JESUS DOES NOT?

FATHER DAVID ENDRES, PROFESSOR AT MOUNT ST. MARY'S SEMINARY & SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Q: In Matthew 24, Jesus says no one

knows when the world will end. He says that the Son does not know, only the Father. The Son is consubstantial with the Father in the Trinity. How can the Father know and the Son not know? This puzzles me.

A: The Gospels of Matthew (24:36) and Mark (13:32) record that the "day and hour" of the Second Coming "no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but the Father alone." The attribution of certain knowledge to God the Father—and not to Jesus—is puzzling and the questions that arise from it are not new. The Evangelist Luke, though he offers a nearly identical account as Matthew and Mark in terms of the prediction of the Second Coming, does not include this saying in his Gospel. Some early manuscript sources for Matthew and Mark even omit "nor the Son" because of the theological difficulties it seemed to present.

The Church Fathers wrestled with the question, but did not arrive at a common interpretation. Origen surmised that "nor the Son" referred to the church since Christ is the head and the church "knows not the day nor the hour." St. Athanasius offered the possibility that while Jesus professed His ignorance, He did in fact share in some way in the Father's knowledge of the Second Coming. St. Basil, similarly, suggested that Jesus did not know on His own, but through the Father who knew "first."


That the knowledge of Father and Son could be unequal can be explained by Jesus' two natures, human and divine. In coming among us as a man, God "emptied himself." As God and man, Jesus acquired knowledge not only as a divine person, but as one who was human. Any lack of knowledge can be attributed to His human nature. As St. Gregory Nazianzen wrote, "He knows as God and knows not as man."

More particularly, this difficult question is usually framed by considering the consciousness of Christ. Beginning in the Middle Ages, theologians divided Jesus' consciousness into passive and active knowledge. He knew all as God but could not access that in His active human consciousness. While it can be said that He knew the time of the Second Coming, it was not actively known.

In many ways, this places Jesus in the whole flow of Revelation from the very beginning. As Louis Bouyer argued, along with the Church Fathers, all has been revealed, but all is not realized. Jesus was the "secret," or mystery, of the Hebrew Scriptures which could only be realized in His Incarnation. In like manner, Jesus' human knowledge was fully realized in His Passion, Death, and Resurrection. When Mary and Joseph found Jesus in the Temple, Scripture says He

went home with them and "increased in wisdom and stature" (Luke 2:52). He was able to grow in His human condition toward divine wholeness.

None of this can serve as the definitive answer to your question, but just as we cannot fully grasp Jesus as "true God and true Man," neither will we completely figure this "secret" out. The question itself, however, can draw us toward the mystery of the Trinity and can inspire vigilance and combat laxity. As we follow the words of both Matthew and Mark, we can be assured that Jesus, not knowing the day or hour, can lead us more surely into the mystery of our faith and the desire to possess that mystery more fully.
