## THE SILENCE OF HOLY WEEK

With today's celebration of Palm (or Passion) Sunday, we begin the holiest week of the entire year. We enter into that week where we recall those mysteries that lie at the very foundation of our holy Catholic faith: the entry of the true King of kings and Lord of lords into Jerusalem, the holy city, on Palm Sunday. That intimate gathering of Jesus with His apostles in the upper room on Holy Thursday, where He instituted the great gift of His Most Holy Body and Blood in the Eucharist, and the gift of the sacramental priesthood in the Church by which that gift of the Eucharist might forever endure. His arrest later that night in the garden, and then the horrific tortures of His Passion, leading up to the moment of His death on the Cross for our sake.

And then, after His death on the Cross and His burial in the tomb... the silence. One of the earliest writings related to Easter is found in the Office of Readings from the Liturgy of the Hours. It is an ancient homily on Holy Saturday, penned by an unknown author. In it, the author (likely an early bishop) speaks of that first Holy Saturday:
> "Something strange is happening-there is a great silence on earth today, a great silence and stillness. The whole earth keeps silence because the King is asleep. The earth trembled and is still, because God has fallen asleep in the flesh and He has raised up all who have slept ever since the world began. God has died in the flesh and hell trembles with fear.
> He has gone to search for our first parents, as for a lost sheep. Greatly desiring to visit those who live in darkness and the shadow of death, He has gone to free from sorrow the captives Adam and Eve. The Lord approached them bearing the Cross, the weapon that had won Him the victory. At the sight of Him, Adam, the first man He had created, struck his breast in terror and cried out to everyone: 'My Lord be with you all.' Christ answered him: 'And with your spirit.' He took him by the hand and raised him up, saying, 'Awake, O sleeper, and rise from the dead....'"

I pray that during the week ahead, but most especially during Good Friday and Holy Saturday, you find some time to just sit in the silence. Maybe even spend some time in the church (which we will keep open both days). If you do, it will feel "strange" to you as well. No candles, no ornamentation. Most of all, no Jesus... from the end of the period of Holy Thursday adoration until the Easter Vigil, the Blessed Sacrament is removed from the tabernacle. These are the only two days of the year you will walk into a Catholic Church and the Eucharistic presence of Jesus will be gone. If it feels strange, it should. If you walk into the church on Good Friday or Holy Saturday and it feels like "something is wrong"-good. It should feel that way. Because something is wrong.

The King is asleep. And all the world is silent. With you at the foot of the Cross,

## WOMEN OF THE BIBLE: HAGAR

Writing about Hagar, Sarah's maidservant, should start by a notice about the formation of the Bible Books. Contrary to the modern idea of one author writing his or her book, each Bible book usually has many authors. This rule has rare exceptions: The Song of Songs and the individual Psalms are amongst them. Otherwise, most of the Bible books are made of many units or narratives (exegetes-those who study Sacred Scripture-call them traditions) written by different authors and often in different times and places. Another individual than the authors, (exegetes call him editor), is responsible for putting together narratives with the same themes to form the Bible books we know. However, the final decision for a book to be part of the Bible belongs to the people of God. The books they used in their liturgy and their personal devotion integrate together into the Bible. The authors, the editor, and the people of God, guided by the Holy Spirit, are responsible for the Holy Bible we know. All this is to say that the story concerning Hagar in the Book of Genesis reached us in two traditions, written in two different times, in two different places. The editor who believed in the truthfulness of the two traditions (despite few chronological inconsistencies) did not favor a particular one. This explains the presence of two narratives concerning Hagar.

Let us start by asking: Who is Hagar and what is her origin? The obvious biblical answer is that she was an Egyptian woman. A Jewish post-biblical tradition made of her Pharaoh's daughter. Discovering that Sarah, whom he attempted to marry, was Abraham's wife, Pharaoh, out of fear of being punished for his mistake, lavished all kinds of gifts on the Patriarch. One of these gifts was no other than his own daughter, given to be Sarah's servant. It is an old story that has no biblical foundation. Italians have an adequate saying about such fictive explanations: se non è vero è ben trovato, "if it is not true, at least it is beautiful."

As written above, Hagar's story reached us in two traditions. The first tradition is narrated in Gen 16:1-16 where Sarah, fearing the disappearing of Abraham lineage, offered him the possibility of having a son by her servant Hagar. The passage ends by the expulsion of Hagar, pregnant, by her mistress (Gen 16:6). A cruel story that the tradition received with embarrassment. However, a few points need to be clarified. First, it is not unusual amongst the rich old families to see a barren wife "offering" her servant to the husband in order to have a child. The child will be considered the legitimate wife's child, allowing the family to have descendants. We will encounter such customs in Gen 30:3 when Rachel, infertile until then, offered her servant, Bilhah, to Jacob which will allow him to have descendants through her servant. The difficulty is that being mother of the heir
does not change the status of the maidservant: She should continue to be the wife's servant, while her son is free. Furthermore, the Jewish exegetical tradition came to the rescue of Sarah by adding another explanation: Hagar was gossiping against Sarah by stating that her mistress refuses to bear a child to avoid the pregnancy consequences on her body. Another story that has no biblical foundation. The first story ends by the expulsion of Hagar who was left to die in the desert. However, the angel of the Lord who promised a great future to Hagar's son, convinced her to return to her mistress.

The second tradition concerning Hagar can be found in Gen 21: 8-21. Like the first tradition, this passage too is rich in all kinds of meanings. Let us concentrate on one verse 21:9. Here it is: Sarah saw the son of Hagar, the Egyptian, who had borne to Abraham, playing. The last word of the verse, playing, has three meanings. First, its obvious meaning: playing, including sport plays. This is the preferred translation of the Christian tradition. The second meaning is mocking, which is the preferred translation of the Jewish tradition. The third meaning, especially if read with reference to 2 Samuel $2: 14$, is to murder. It seems that Sarah, seeing Ishmael playing, had the vision that he may become a possible murderer of her son Isaac. There is also a legal argument that, if it does not justify the harsh treatment of Hagar, makes her expulsion a necessity. Indeed, the promise made to Abraham wouldn't be possible through Isaac if the first born and natural heir, Ishmael, is still in his father's house. He and not Isaac would oversee realizing God's promise to Abraham.
